We have asked John Andrew the curator of the Pearson Silver Collection to set the scene for our forthcoming selling exhibitions:

Why did British Silver blossom post 1945?

We now talk about a Renaissance in British silver post World War II. There is no doubting that from the 1950s the UK has been a melting pot of creativity for silversmiths that today manifests itself in Britain being recognised as a world centre of excellence for designer-makers of silver objects.

Even in the early 1960s reference was made to the contemporary 'bursting of design and craftsmanship in [British] silver' that is comparable to the 'great age' – the 18th century*. What brought about this gigantic change? Some say it is well documented. True, it possible by scouring through what sundry published works cover silver immediately after the hostilities to discover what happened. Even before the War ended, the Government recognised that the nation had to improve its design capabilities to achieve exports. Immediately after the War the newly established Council of Industrial Design announced a major exhibition would be held the following year called 'Britain Can Make It'. Attracting over 1.4 million visitors, it was a visual feast, but also performed an educational role explaining the need for industrial design.

The Royal College of Art was seen as a suitable vehicle for helping to raise design standards. Robert Goodden was appointed Professor of the School of Silversmithing and Jewellery. From 1948-78 he saw a galaxy of talented silversmithing students pass through his hands, among the early ones being Eric Clements, David Mellor, Robert Welch and Gerald Benney who in addition to silversmithing, became industrial designers.

Meanwhile at the Goldsmiths' Company, Graham Hughes was busy promoting modern silver by securing the new talent commissions and staging exhibitions at home and abroad. However, during the 1950s all those young silversmiths were influenced to a greater or lesser degree by Scandinavian design. Something else must have happened to have triggered the Renaissance?

At 2pm on the afternoon of 12 July talks on modern and contemporary silver will be held at the Goldsmiths' Centre. The first will answer this question. We hope you will join us.

Father and son team Rob and Jaap Thalen have built an international reputation for exceptional silver vessels and sculptural silver objects. Rob, trained as a sculpture, has pushed the limits of silversmithing with pieces not normally seen at silver exhibitions. "Firstly we weld together two of the largest sections of silver the bullion suppliers can make, at a metre square each, and then Jaap and I can take up to three months to raise and finish a single vessel."

Thalen & Thalen have exhibited most recently at the premier decorative arts exhibition SOFA in New York, selling work at up to \$150,000. Thalen & Thalen pieces are in private and public collections in the US, Europe and Africa.

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


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
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

The Pearson Silver Collection is devoted to Post War British Silver – ie vintage silver from 1945, together with contemporary pieces. Therefore it represents the story of British silversmithing from the end of World War II to the present day.

The Collection has its origins in the mid-1980s. Although it was started in the early 1970s, the interest then was domestic items and collectables such as snuff boxes, caddy spoons and the like and the preference was for the antique. However, in 1985 an interest in 20th century British silver developed. When the scope of the field was fully appreciated, it was decided to concentrate in Post War silver from 1945 to the present day. Other collections were disposed of to help finance the acquisition of pieces for what is now the Pearson Silver Collection. Today, it is widely regarded as the largest of its kind in private hands. Currently it is kept in four geographic locations.

In 2009 it was decided to make the Collection accessible to a wider audience by launching a website entirely devoted to it. In 2010 the site attracted over 190,000 hits. In addition to Showreel Highlights of each decade from the 1940s, and Showreel Highlights of the work of Gerald Benney, Stuart Devlin and Christopher Lawrence, the work of each silversmith represented in the Collection also features in the Gallery. The objective of the website is to bring Post War British designer silver, including contemporary pieces, to a wider audience.

The Pearson Silver Foundation aims to give the Collection greater exposure by arranging loans of pieces to museums in the UK and possibly overseas.
